UNFICYP marks International Women's day 2016

Every year on 8 March, the world comes together to mark International Women's Day, and UNFICYP played its part this year, with all parts of the mission recognising the contribution of women to the mission and to Cyprus.

At UNFICYP HQ, Senior Police Advisor Colonel Andrii Sachavo hosted a traditional Women's Day breakfast at the UNPOL Club, which included remarks by Col. Sachavo and the Head of Mission, Ms. Lisa Buttenheim, as well as coffee and snacks.

Each of UNFICYP's sectors also held events to mark International Women's Day, with troops hearing from their commanders about the important role women play in UNFICYP and the need for more women to participate in peacekeeping.

UNFICYP's Civil Affairs Section organised a panel discussion on 10 March titles, 'How Women Make Peacebuilding Better', addressing among other things the need to employ new

approaches to peacebuilding that involve greater participation of women.

The mission's Public Information Office produced a special edition of the Blue Beret magazine dedicated to gender perspectives; the issue included several contributions by male and female personnel on their experiences with gender, and highlighted some of the key events around gender over the past year.

Currently 59 women from Argentina, Paraguay, United Kingdom, Norway, Slovakia, Hungary and Serbia serve within UNFICYP's military component, representing 7 percent of the total number of troops; these soldiers work in the medical, administrative, logistics, joint operation centres and catering, among others, and range in rank from Lieutenant Colonel to Lance Corporal. Women make up 20 percent of UNPOL personnel serving with UNFICYP.
